You don't have to visit an art gallery or a local museum to view some of the city's most outstanding art pieces. Public artworks and sculptures such as Fernando Botero's Bird and Salvador Dali's Homage to Newton, both located along the Singapore River, are free for viewing 24/7. Homage to Newton by Salvador Dali
